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# Message from the Chair

I am now coming to the end of my fifth year as Chair of Trustees. Since the last AGM report 12 months ago Charlton Toy Library (CTL) has now become firmly established as a warm and welcoming environment for local families. At the same time we are coming to the end of a long period of funding from BBC Children in Need. We are most grateful for this period of funding which has helped us to significantly impact positively on some of the most deprived local families. However it would be misleading if I did not admit that as trustees we look forward to the coming 12 months funding picture with some trepidation.

Our long standing relationship with the Royal Borough of Greenwich was reinforced recently by the visit to our Friday Stay and Play by RBG Councillors Jo Van Den Broek and Mayor David Gardner. We are delighted to welcome these important stakeholders, and to share images of their visit on our social media channels. Other important local partners we have developed relationships more recently with include Quaggy Development Trust, Charlton Family Centre and our landlord, Peabody Estates.

With respect to the charity's finances, our financial position remains extremely precarious. A sub-group of trustees has been working tirelessly for the last 6 months making applications to funders. Unfortunately, despite some limited success, the charity's finances are very seriously depleted. The top priority of trustees over the coming months is to secure funding for our core costs. We're grateful that the Leader of Royal Borough of Greenwich, Cllr. Anthony Okereke, who recently became aware of our financial plight, has asked council officers to provide us with suggestions and expert support to help us with our funding applications.

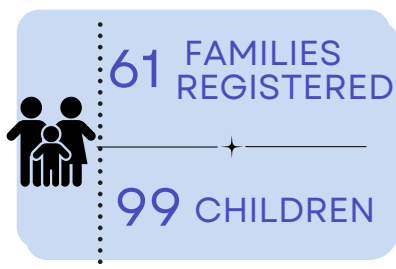
## Reach and impact

Overall, in 2025-26 we were proud to support 260 children in 186 families. Almost a third (32%) of these families accessed our services completely free of charge and a further 17% paid a concessionary rate, while 19% were lone-parent households. In the current cost-of-living crisis, support for less-well-off families remains a key priority for the charity. Around 34% of the families we serve are from the global majority, and we will keep working to ensure our membership truly reflects the rich ethnic and cultural diversity of Greenwich.

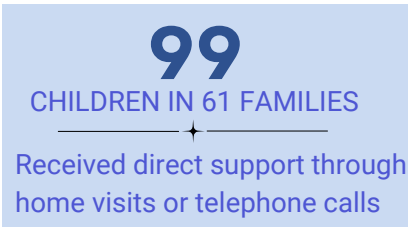
## Our Outreach Service

# Our story



Charlton Toy Library is a registered charity offering an inter-linked support service for the under 5s community in the Royal Borough of Greenwich. We operate a toy, book and safety equipment loan scheme and a stay and play service in our main base along with a much-needed Outreach service to support disadvantaged families and children in desperate need.

Charlton Toy Library is a registered charity, governed by a constitution adopted 10th February 1982. It is run by members of a voluntary Management Committee (who are also the charity trustees), staff (a Toy Library Co-ordinator and an Outreach Worker) and volunteers, all helping to run play & borrowing sessions and giving help, support and advice to families.

# AIMS AND OBJECTIVES



## AIMS

To promote the principle that play does matter for the developing child.



We aim to improve the current quality of life and future life chances of local children by providing a much-needed child-centred support service to families in our main premises at Langhorne House and through our outreach service HomeStart and other child-centred groups, as well as other hard-to-reach families referred by Health Visitors and other health professionals. We also offer a low-cost toy/book/games and child safety equipment loan scheme.



Many of the children we support through our Outreach Service live in families experiencing poverty and disadvantage, some have suffered domestic violence and many feel isolated. This has a huge negative impact on the children's well-being and development. Our intervention at an early formative stage in their development aims to break the cycle of deprivation by improving their literacy, numeracy, creative & social skills, thus improving their school careers and their future life chances and contributing to stronger, more cohesive communities.



## OBJECTIVES

- To make play available and lend appropriate toys to extend the opportunity for shared play into the home.
- To provide play areas where children and adults can use a wide range of toys and creative activities.
- To offer an opportunity to socialise and exchange experiences.
- To offer a befriending and supportive service to parents and carers.







# Outreach report

Our Outreach service is in its 13<sup>th</sup> year of funding from BBC Children in Need and we have secured a grant to keep this much-needed support for vulnerable local families going until September 2026. In 2025-2026 I have worked with 61 families and 99 children.

Referral for our services continue to come from many local organisations such as Home Start, Family Engagement Support Workers from Children's Centres, Health Visitors, Social Workers, The Pre-birth Assessment Team, Best Beginnings Midwives Team, Early Years Quaggy Development Trust, and others too. Some families hear about our services and refer themselves directly to us.

The children supported have many and varied struggles to deal with, such as family with a low income, disabilities, families experiencing domestic abuse, Mental Health and families with no recourse to public funds of any kind. Our aim is to give these children some sense of a "normal" childhood... to just be kids... playing and having fun.

On my first visit to the family home, I assess what help is needed. I begin by helping to improve the physical wellbeing of the child/children by providing, completely free of charge, essential clothing, Moses basket/cot, prams, various baby equipment, child home safety equipment and much more. Once the safety and physical comfort of the child/children have improved, I then supply the toys, books and games that families are not able to afford. These items keep the children constructively occupied. They learn to play happily within the home, with their parents and siblings, improving behaviour and learn through play.

I work with parents and carers, helping them to understand the importance of play in their child/children's development. These measures together help children develop and learn, making them better for school ready, when the time comes.

I support these families within the family home and CTL stay and play sessions. We have a wide range of Sensory toys and equipment to help children within their play.



For 13 years outreach has unofficially operated a small baby bank.

From January 2026 I decided to dedicate our baby bank service **Butterfly Baby Bank** in memory of my son **Ben Jay** who passed in 2022 age 17 years. Ben enjoyed helping me deliver baby equipment and essentials to families, making a difference to children's lives.



So that you can appreciate all the work carried out please consider the following achievements. The figures are slightly lower than usual, due to being closed for two months for our relocation.

We also helped families with whatever was needed to relieve some of the struggles and disadvantage in their lives such as housing problems and emotional and practical support.



When needed we linked with other organisations to extend the range of help.



There has been an increase in the number of outreach families that have visited our stay-and-play sessions and enjoyed the singing and sensory activities. They have socialised with other families and reduced their sense of isolation. I hope to see more and more coming into our stay and play sessions in the near future



I would like to take the opportunity to say a big thank you to Vicky for being there to support and help whenever it has been needed, it means so much to have such an amazing friend and work colleague.



Thank you to all the volunteers who take the time to make outreach happen, their dedication in helping in every possible way, you are all truly amazing.

I also help with cataloguing all the Outreach purchases and donations.

I updated our website and posted regularly on our Facebook and Instagram accounts. I managed the membership accounts and toy database and produced annual reports.

# TREASURER REPORT

## FUNDING & FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

### Financial summary 2025-2026

We finished the financial year 2025-2026 with a deficit of -£2,890, represented by £441 in restricted funding and -£3,331 in unrestricted funds.

The small deficit has been comfortably absorbed from cash reserves. Income across all categories were similar to the previous year. We ended the year with £22,757 in unrestricted reserves. This remains in line with our cash reserves policy which states that we must have available 6-months worth of operating costs to cover any emergencies or unexpected expenditure.



We are very thankful to be in our 13<sup>th</sup> year of funding from BBC Children in Need, who cover much of the costs of our Outreach Service. Through their generous grants over the last 13 years we have been able to support:

As the maximum the BBC usually supports a charity is 9 years (and we have had 13 years!) we are now searching for other funders to continue this valuable work. This is proving to be very challenging in the current economic climate. We have had some success but we still need more grants to ensure the continuation of services.

## THE WOODWARD CHARITABLE TRUST & BARRAT FOUNDATION AND GROWLING WLG UK LTD

We were also very pleased to be awarded a grant from The Woodward Charitable Trust and to receive donations from The Barratt Foundation and Growling WLG UK LTD. Charlton Toy Library cannot exist without this valuable outside funding. The fees we charge are very low and our outreach service has always been completely free of charge to families. In view of our current financial struggles, some fees may need to be raised slightly in the near future.

When you look through our accounts, what we manage to achieve with such a small budget is truly astonishing. Help in kind is therefore essential to the continuation of our services. We would like to extend a huge thank you to Peabody who are providing CTL with our lovely premises currently, completely free of charge. The Atlas Business Group also help by providing all our internet services for free. And of course, we need to thank all our amazing volunteers who help at sessions and events. Without them we could not run all the services that we do.

Thank you also to the local community for their continued support with both physical and financial donations. And thank you to all those other child-related organisations who help us too. Added together, your support and time helps to improve the lives of so many children and families across the borough. And finally, a huge acknowledgement to our two dedicated staff and fellow trustees who go above and beyond. We could not do it without you all.

## CHARLTON TOY LIBRARY INCOME RESERVES POLICY

Unrestricted funds are needed :

- 1 to provide funds which can be designated to specific projects to enable these projects to be undertaken at short notice and
- 2 to cover administration, fund-raising and support costs without which the charity could not function

The trustees consider it prudent that unrestricted reserves should be sufficient:

- ✓ to avoid the necessity of releasing fixed assets held for the charity's use;
- ✓ to cover 6 month's administration, fund-raising and support costs (currently approximately £20,000)
- ✓ to provide a pool equal to 10% of the average charitable expenditure over the preceding 2 years from which funds can be designated to specific projects (currently approximately £3,500).

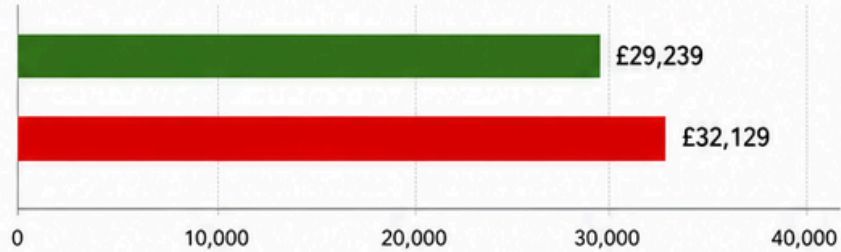
